Brooke and Jaden Harris: Their Name is Today.

Already a mother of two, Brooke Harris* knew the unborn child she carried was different. He nearly constantly twisted and turned, punched and kicked. That restlessness continued outside the womb. Even in his sleep he rolled back and forth, and as



soon as he could walk, he would run from one end of his crib to the other, hitting himself on the railings.

As her boy grew, so did the rage. Almost daily, he would damage property and himself. He threatened to hurt others, too. When each episode passed, Jaden* had no recollection, only sorrow, for what he had done.

Brooke began seeking help

for Jaden when he was still a preschooler, constantly running into experts with no answers. "I felt very alone," says Brooke. "It's a lonely, dark path to be on because you can't see a future, and you just keep looking and hoping and praying. It's the most terrible place to be when you can't find help."

When Jaden was finally diagnosed, Brooke saw more clearly what she was up against. Jaden was suffering with ADHD (attention deficit hyperactivity disorder), ADD (attention deficit disorder), anxiety, depression, obsessive-compulsive disorder and oppositional defiant disorder. She worried about his future. She worried what would happen to him when she passed.

After receiving treatment in a residential setting, Jaden returned home, and Brooke set out to find a school that could handle her troubled boy. She found Family & Children's Center's midlevel day treatment program, an alternative education program that includes both special education and therapeutic services. Because of the severity of Jaden's challenges, the center wasn't certain at first whether Jaden was a candidate for the program. Even when he did begin treatment, he continued to struggle and accrued several assault and destruction of private property charges. At the height of his problems and without provocation, he flew into an angry fit and attacked his mother, hitting her so hard, he broke her rib.

"Family & Children's Center gave it a try, even though he still had all his problems," says Brooke. "The world is always saying goodbye to kids like Jaden. They give up and don't want to deal with them. Family & Children's Center stepped in when the rest of the world stepped out."

Family & Children's Center's professional staff worked with Jaden to help him with both behaviors and academics,

and Brooke diligently continued the work at home, facing each day with determination and dedication. Over time, he learned coping skills and ways to recognize feelings and control emotions. As medications were prescribed and adjusted,

Jaden grew eager to learn, ready to control himself.

He learned to follow rules. He began doing chores before school. He began caring about other people and making friends. And he started earning A's in school, even achieving A honor roll.

Before the turnaround, Jaden had four felony charges on his record and faced nine years of parole. But through his hard work, his

probation is now scheduled to end this year.

"Now Jaden sees himself like every other kid," says Brooke. "I see that Jaden is going to be able to do anything he sets his mind to. He may not be where his peers are yet,



but there is nothing stopping him how. If he wants something, he'll achieve it."

Brooke credits Family & Children's Center for giving Jaden better tomorrows. "They're there for children and families. They invest in the child. Even during the rough patches, they never talked about giving up like the rest of the world."

When school begins this fall, Jaden will return to a mainstream school. But Brooke doesn't worry. She knows Family & Children's Center is here.

2010 Highlights

In a tumultuous time for the human services industry, Family & Children's Center continued to thrive in 2010, due in large part to our generous community partners and dedicated, expert staff.

- Received contributions exceeding \$75,000 as beneficiary of several community initiatives, including Tri-Quest, Dahl Lube-a-thon, ALM Charities Golf Outing and Grandmas Gone Wild
- Significantly expanded programming in southeast MN with Treatment Foster Care and Youth Night Campus
- Completed first-ever comprehensive fundraising campaign, the Campaign for Better Tomorrows, in La Crosse, WI
- Integrated peers into Community Support Programs to serve people who suffer from chronic, persistent mental illness
- Received Ronald McDonald House Charities grant to renovate La Crosse Play Therapy Room
- Incorporated Positive Behavior Support/Trauma Informed Care treatment modality in our youth services
- Earned agency-wide national re-accreditation with Council on Accreditation
- Earned reaccreditation for Healthy Families through Healthy Families America
- Earned accreditation for Stepping Stones Children's Advocacy Center through National Children's Alliance

2010 Healthy Families Data

Healthy Families continues to be a flagship program for Family & Children's Center, preventing child abuse before it ever has a chance to occur. It's an example of how our evidence-based approach really does result in better tomorrows.

Outcomes for 2010 include:

- 1,954 family home visits were conducted
- 96 families, including 110 target children received services
- 100 percent of participant families had a health care provider
- 100 percent of participant children were up-to-date on immunizations
- Only 5 percent of families showed a need for parent-child enrichment after a home inventory assessment



- 4 children were identified to have development delays and were referred for more intensive services through Birth to Three
- 74 percent of set goals, as identified on individual family support plans, were achieved


